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AHC PROFESSIONALS HEAD NORTH FOR THE SUMMER

Doctors, researchers, and professionals from around the world are coming together this month at the AHCF Family Meeting.

They will all attend the AHCF sponsored scientific workshop titled, "Achieving Consensus on Definitions and Outcomes for Natural History Studies and Clinical Trials in ATP1A3 Related Disorders." The workshop will be co-chaired by Dr. Kathryn Swoboda and Dr. Allison Brashear.

The primary purpose of the workshop is to bring together key stakeholders from diverse backgrounds to better educate the community about the diversity and complexity of neurologic phenotypes associated with mutations in ATP1A3, and to identify and prioritize key milestones for success in moving towards targeted therapies for ATP1A3 disorders.

A critical goal for this meeting includes working towards consensus on definitions and outcome measures that are both clinically meaningful to patients as well as practical to assess in the context of clinical studies and trials.
